

Robert E. Rubin

Robert E. Rubin served as the seventieth U.S. secretary of the treasury from 1995 to 1999. He first joined the Clinton Administration in 1993 as director of the newly-created National Economic Council (NEC). He began his career in finance at Goldman, Sachs & Company in 1966. He served as vice-chairman and co-chief operating officer from 1987 to 1990 and as co-senior partner and co-chairman from 1990 to 1992. Before joining Goldman, he was an attorney at the firm of Cleary, Gottlieb, Steen & Hamilton. From 1999 to 2009, Rubin served as a member of the board of directors at Citigroup and as a senior adviser to the company. In addition, he worked extensively with the firm's clients around the world. On January 9, he announced his intention to retire from the company and not stand for reelection as a board member.

Rubin is the chairman of the board of the Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC). In 2006, Rubin was one of the founders of the Hamilton Project. He is the author of *In An Uncertain World: Tough Choices from Wall Street to Washington*, which was a *New York Times* bestseller as well as being named one of *Business Week's* ten best business books of the year. In 2003, he was named vice chairman of the Council on Foreign Relations and in 2007, he was named co-chairman. Rubin also serves on the board of trustees of Mount Sinai Medical Center. In 2000, he became a member of the Advisory Board of Insight Venture Partners. He is also a member of the Harvard Corporation.

Rubin graduated summa cum laude from Harvard College with an AB in economics. He received an LLB from Yale Law School and attended the London School of Economics.
